There are people who collect stamps that are oddly shaped, or items that aren't technically stamps, such as labels and seals. These are commonly called Cinderellas (because they appear to be something they're not). Some people collect revenue stamps, which are used by the country of issue to tax items. Many more people collect stamps according to topic, such as animals, birds, or fish, people on stamps, such as authors or scientists, or sport scenes, flowers, art or crafts, the list of stamp collections by topics is 5.144 practically endless.




